As we have often predicted, the Republicans are preparing to jump Jim Crow on their Intervention dogma and adopt Popular Sovereignty as the permanent creed of the party. In less than one year, whether Lincoln is elected or licked, "Non-intervention" will be their rallying cry.

See what the Cincinnati *Commercial*, a loud and leading Republican organ, says about "Intervention:"

"Congressional legislation for the protection or prohibition of slavery in the Territories is hardly among the possibilities of the future.—The idea of protecting slave property in the Territories by act of Congress is an absurd abstraction. The idea of prohibiting slavery in the Territories by act of Congress is obsolete. The people of the Territories will determine the question of slavery for themselves, and Congress will admit new States without reference to slavery. In a few months these propositions will be almost universally recognized as fixed facts. There is no question but the people will make the new States free States, and there is an end of it. The present Presidential campaign disposes of Mr. Douglas. The great principle of Popular Sovereignty, relieved of him, and no longer obscured by his evasive and dishonest championship, will be sufficient for the settlement of the issues of the Territorial extension of slavery."

That will do as a premonitory declaration. Look out for a general stampede of all the Black Republican papers, after "Douglas is disposed of."

SENATOR CHASE COMING OVER TOO.

At Covington, Kentucky, the other day, Senator Chase, of Ohio, used the following language as reported in the Ohio State *Journal*, his personal and political organ:

"I say to you frankly, that Republicans mean to exclude slavery from the Territories. As to the mode of exclusion, they are comparatively indifferent. They are willing to accept any mode which will certainly be effective. They believe that the Constitution, justly interpreted, would, of itself, accomplish the object. Give them such an interpretation, and an honest administration of the Federal Government, and they will be content. They regard simple prohibition as another mode, and they will be content. And most of them believe—I certainly believe for one—that a true doctrine of Federal Non-Intervention and Popular Sovereignty, fairly, honestly applied, would almost certainly have the same result, and, failing to obtain prohibition, they will not hesitate to avail themselves of that."
