Capt. Bennett with a party of fifty cavalry ventured four miles within the rebel pickets beyond Alexandria. He reports that many of the dwellings, built in fine taste and surrounded by beautiful gardens and shrubbery, have been deserted by their owners, who have not even taken care of their contents. He saw silver ware and other valubles lying on the tables and in the closets, the buildings in all their appointments bearing evidence of hav. ing been abandoned in great haste. Many of the negroes that he met begged most pitcously of him to take them in safety to his camp. There was a general desire expressed by them to come within the Federal lines.

Seven negroes belonging to the estate of the late John A. Washington fied from one of his plantations beyond the Occoquan, were brought into Fort Lyon, whence they were sent to Washington.

Gen. Hooker made a reconnoissance at Matthias Point. On returning, the troops were followed by numbers of slaves. One gaug numbered 50.

Judge Freese has heard several applications during the past twenty four hours for judicial aid in the capture of runaway negroes. They were all refused.
