Sayles and Brown bave got in trouble in attempting to send five friends North. Bayles made a bargalu with Captain Good rich, master of the schoon Grace Darling, of Boston, to carry them North for \$25 a piece, and sent Brown to the captain to make arrangements to put them on board. The captain told Brown to have ihem on board at II o'clock Saturday night. Brown did so, and gave the captain \$125 ceived the money, he said to Brown he had forgot something, and he took the boat and came ashore and got the police, and had the people put in jail. The gentlemen la Norfolk are getting up a sum of two hundred dollars for the captain. There were four men and one woman among them. May the Lord stand by them."
